

List of cities in Mongolia

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This is a **list of cities in Mongolia**.

The following table includes cities of more than 7,500 inhabitants, their names in English transliteration and Mongolian. The results are from the census of January 5 2000 as well as from a population estimation for the end of 2008. If 2008 year data was not accessible, the closest and most reliable data was used and noted by an index.

The population and growth estimates for years 1979 and 1989 were added to show the historical significance of population growth and urbanisation throughout Mongolia alongside with the overall growth of Mongolia.

Key: For population growth 1979 - 2008



Cities in Mongolia of more than 7,500 inhabitants

- Salmon cells indicate that the population has declined or experienced minimal (<1%) growth.
- Light green cells indicate a growth between 1-2%.
- Dark Green cells indicate a growth of greater than or equal to 2%.

The higher level administrative unit is the aimag, except for Ulan Bator which administrates its own federal district (Nalaikh and Baganuur are administrated by Ulan Bator). The numbers of inhabitants relate to the cities proper without surrounding districts.

Mongolia is divided into 21 **aimags** (Mongolian: *аймаг*, sometimes translated to *province* ^[1]). Each aimag is subdivided into several sums.^{[2][3]} The name *aimag* is derived from the Mongolian and Turkic languages word for "tribe".^[citation needed] The capital, Ulaanbaatar, is governed as an independent municipality separate from Tov Aimag, in which it is located.

Dundgovi (Mongolian: Дундговь, *Middle Gobi*) is one of the 21 aimags (provinces) of Mongolia. It is located in the south of the country, approximately 245 kilometers (152 miles) south of Ulaanbaatar. Its capital is Mandalgovi.

Climate

Dundgobi province is situated in the south of the country about 240 km from capital city Ulaanbaatar. It has largely semi-arid steppe and low height hills. Temperatures in the summer may top 90 degrees Fahrenheit (32 degrees Celsius), while winter temperatures may dip below -22 degrees Fahrenheit (-30 degrees Celsius). Precipitation is scarce, and air humidity is low.

Seasonal climatic problems include spring sandstorms and winter zud.

Transportation

There is no commercial air transport to the Dundgobi province. Public transportation includes bus but many of the more rural sums are not on the mass transport lines. Much travel is done via *mikrs* (micro-bus or Russian furgon) or by private jeeps.

Many locals own 250 cc motorcycles, which they use as their main mode of transportation.

Local Economy

The province's main industry is animal husbandry and livestock products (such as wool, cashmere). The Dundgobi province is also noted among Mongolian locals for its *airag* (fermented horse milk), a traditional Mongolian alcoholic drink.

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Bor-Öndör

Bor-Öndör (Mongolian: Бор-Өндөр) is a city in Khentii Province in eastern Mongolia. It is situated in the Darkhan sum (district), but is administrated separately.

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Geography

The City is at an elevation of 1300 meters and located close to the northern semi-desert edge of the Gobi Desert. Its administrated area is 144 km².^[1]

Population

The population was 6,406 in 2001, and had grown to 8,510 by 2006^[2]. Bor-Öndör is the second most populous city in Khentii Province after the capital Öndörkhaan.

Economy

The city's economy is dominated by Fluorspar mining and fluorspar concentrate production. The underground mine, open pit and mineral processing plant, which is the only mineral processing plant in the country, are operated by the Mongolroستvetmet JV company. All fluorspar products are exported to the Russia, the Ukraine, and other countries by rail.^[3]

In 2007 there were 39,218 heads of livestock in Bor-Öndör. However, they do not have enough pasture land due to mining.^[2]

History

Fluorspar deposits were surveyed by Soviet geologists in the 1950s. In 1973, the Soviet-Mongolian (currently Russian-Mongolian) company was created, with 49% of shares held by the Soviet (now Russian) government and 51% by the Mongolian government. The mine, open pit mine, mineral processing plant and worker's housing were built by the Soviets. All production during that time was exported to the Soviet Union.

Transportation

Bor-Öndör has a railway connection to the Ulan-Ude - Ulan Bator - Beijing line (Trans-Mongolian Railway).

Unpaved roads connect Bor-Öndör with Darkhan sum centre (43 km) of Khentii Province and with

the Khentii Province capital Öndörkhaan (144 km) via Darkhan. Unpaved roads also connect with the Khajuu-Ulaan mining settlement (43 km) and Ikhkheth (65 km), Airag (65 km), Dalanjargalan (59 km) sums of Dornogovi Province. Via Airag is connection with paved road Ulan Bator (360 km) - Choir (165 km) - Sainshand (187 km) - Zamyn-Üüd (277 km), and onward to Beijing.
